

Portrait - a painting, drawing, photograph, or engraving of a person, especially one depicting only the face or head and shoulders.



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



There are many types of lines: thick, thin, horizontal, vertical, zigzag, diagonal, curly, curved, spiral, etc. and are often very expressive. Lines are basic tools for artists.



A line's width is sometimes called its "thickness". Lines are sometimes called "strokes", especially when referring to lines in digital artwork.





Key Vocabulary

Form - he visible shape or configuration of something

Texture - he feel, appearance, or consistency of a surface or substance

Stylised - depict or treat in a mannered and non-realistic style

Perspective -refers to the representation of objects in three-dimensional space

Representational - that represents some aspect of reality, in a more or less straightforward way.

Ornamentation - decorative elements added to something to enhance its appearance

Wax Resist

Batik is a traditional wax-resist dyeing technique in various countries. Batik textiles (linen soaked in wax and scratched) were even used in Egypt to wrap mummies.



Key Vocabulary

Divisionism - is a late nineteenth century painting technique that involved using tiny adjacent dabs of primary colour to create the effect of light.

Impressionism - a literary or artistic style that seeks to capture a feeling or experience rather than to achieve accurate depiction.

Composition-the arrangement of elements within a work of art.

Tonal - tone refers to the relative lightness or darkness of a colour

Sculpture - is the branch of the visual arts that operates in three dimensions.



Cubism - is a **style of art**, begun in the early twentieth century, in which objects are represented as if they could be seen from several different positions at the same time, using

many lines and geometric shapes.




Abstract art is art that does not attempt to represent an accurate
